The Society of Afghan Engineers 2017 Annual Conference

The Society of Afghan Engineers 2017 Annual Conference was held in Alexandria, Virginia on October 14, 2017. The following is a brief report of the conference.

"Afghanistan Sustainable Development" By

The Society of Afghan Engineers (SAE) held its 2017 Annual Conference on, Saturday October 14, 2017 from 9:30 AM to 5:00 PM. The Conference was held at the Dunya Banquet Hall located at 5951 Stevenson Avenue in Alexandria, Virginia.

The objective of the Conference was to initiate discussions on existing problems experienced in the areas of development in Afghanistan and their possible implementable and sustainable solutions.

The Conference was well-attended with approximately 60 participants including the US Afghan Embassy representative, Ms. Angiza Nasiree, Policy and Strategy Counsellor, and representatives from USAID Office for Afghanistan and Pakistan Affairs, Mr. Mark Schneider, Afghanistan Desk Officer and Mr. Thomas Bauhan, Senior engineer.

The Conference opened with the recital of select verses from the Holy Quran by Mr. Ahmad Muqhset Moqami. After the Quran recitation, the SAE Chairperson of the Board of Directors, Ms.Shekib gave the Opening Remarks and the Conference theme overview. Mr. Atiq Panjshiri, the SAE President briefly described the SAE Activities.

The Conference speakers presented their papers on various topics based on the theme of the Conference "Afghanistan Sustainable Development". The agenda was strictly followed, except for two absent presenters, and the empty slots were filled by other presenters.

Ms Angiza Nasiree, the Afghan Embassy representative elaborated on the functions of the Afghan Embassy. She presented the Embassy's message and willingness to liaise with SAE and convey their ideas and proposals to the Afghan Government.

The USAID representatives gave an overview of projects in Afghanistan and outlined the long-term development plan for Afghanistan's reconstruction projects as well as their level of funding which provides the opportunity for planning and prioritization of the development process. The consideration of the sustainability and durability issues of the infrastructure during their design and construction were addressed. The following were the highlights of presentations:

The Conference deliberations highlighted the many aspects of Urban Development. Discussions were made about the factors that need to be taken into consideration during the process of Urban Planning and Urban Development in a sustainable manner to ensure the developed infrastructure lasts for the long-term. The following were among the highlights of presentations:

Mr. A. Manan Khalid presented a paper, entitled, "Urban Flooding & Flood Control Solutions". In his presentation, he emphasized on the topic of Urbanization and its challenges including urban flooding and the measures that should be taken to control these challenges. He elaborated on the importance of preventing flood disasters in urban areas with sustainable solutions.

Dr. Saleh Mohammad Keshawarz presented his paper titled: Groundwater Exploration in Afghanistan using remote sensing and GIS and demonstrated the importance of tapping into groundwater as a natural resource in a sustainable way to ensure long-term availability.

At this juncture, time was made available for a panel discussion where Dr. Saleh Mohammad Keshawarz, Mr. Manan Khalid together with Mr. Mark Schneider, the USAID representative took questions from the audience. The presenters responded to the questions.

After the Lunch Break, Dr. Gul Afghan Saleh made his presentation on "Afghanistan Environment from an Engineering Perspective". He discussed a few items including the lack of critical elements such as management policies and processes, uniform construction standards, systematic quality control and quality assurance programs, effective project management, staff training for technology adoption, operation and maintenance, and research to inform sound Architectural and Engineering best practices in a sustainable manner.

A Panel discussion was chaired by Ms. Shekib with four panel members:

- Mr. Manan Khalid spoke about the Urbanization of Kabul City;
- Dr. Mahmoud Samizay, spoke on Urban Planning/Development Process in Afghanistan;
- Mr. Humayoon Ibrahim, spoke on Urban Development Process in USA, and
- Dr. Gul Afghan Saleh, spoke on Urban Development Process worldwide.

The objective of the Panel discussion was to compare the Urban Development process in Afghanistan to the rest of the world. At the end, the Panel responded to the audience questions.

Overall, the Conference covered important areas of development and emphasized on the sustainability of investments in the development process. The Conference met its objectives in conveying the shared information to the Afghan government for implementation for the attainment of sustainable development.

Closing remarks were given by the president of SAE, Mr. Atiq Panjshiri.

The Conference was adjourned at 5:00 PM.

The SAE 2017 Annual Conference Executive Summary

Summary

The following executive summary discusses the major challenges associated with urbanization and proposed solutions for Afghanistan's sustainable development. These topics were discussed at SAE's Annual Conference which was held on Saturday October 14, 2017.

Challenges to Afghanistan's Sustainable Development

Urbanization

Urbanization is a process whereby populations move from rural to urban area, enabling cities and towns to grow. It can also be termed as the progressive increase of the number of people living in towns and cities. It is highly influenced by the notion that cities and towns have better economic, political, and social conditions compared to the rural areas.

Accordingly, urbanization is very common in developing and developed worlds as more and more people have the tendency of moving closer to towns and cities for privileged social and economic services as well as benefits. These include social and economic advantages such as better education, health care, sanitation, housing, business opportunities, and transportation. In countries savaged by decades of civil unrest, such as Afghanistan, security also becomes a deciding factor.

Urbanization could be very costly for countries coming out of civil wars such as Afghanistan. During decades of civil war, infrastructure throughout Afghanistan, especially in larger cities where they existed to some extent, were destroyed and Kabul took the brunt of that. Return of millions of refugees and rural population seeking security and welfare, made Kabul the main settling location. A city planned for 750,000 people became home to almost 6 million people. The city expanded out of bounds while the infrastructure remained a challenge.

This forced urbanization made Kabul City the 5th fastest growing city in the world, but with a huge price. Lack of basic housing, shortage of electricity, roads, sanitary systems, water, and drainage has created a havoc. Most housing has been built without any regard to zoning and permitting process, and as a result, the uncontrolled urbanization has become a huge liability. Among many other problems, urban flooding has

become a major issue for larger cities, especially Kabul City. Uncontrolled construction, concrete sidewalks, concrete/asphalted roads, concrete ditches, paved parking lots, paved private residential front and back yards has drastically reduced the possibility of water to percolate into the ground, thereby reducing recharge and increasing surface runoff. Reduced recharge has caused the water table to keep on dropping and people digging deeper and deeper in search of clean water.

Proposed Solutions to the Urbanization Challenges

The following suggestions are presented to curb some of the noted problems of urbanization and reverse the trend of deteriorating living conditions in Kabul City.

Urban Flooding & Flood Control Solutions

When land is not developed, the runoff is approximately 10%. When development comes and land gets occupied by buildings, roads, sidewalks and other impervious surface, the surface runoff increases to 55% and the ground water recharge goes down from 25% to 5%. It is estimated that 70% residences in Kabul are illegal and built without any permit or proper approved construction Plan process, monitoring and construction inspection and/or enforcement of standards. Undeveloped land that is needed to absorb the rain and snow water has become scares, to the extent, that the Kabul River bed is being used for business and living.

To control the effect of urban flooding and to increase recharge, the City must adopt and promote the use of permeable pavers that easily allows water to be absorbed into the ground below. There are many other solutions, such as bio swales and drywells that can be used where feasible to control surface runoff and recharge ground water.

In recent years, "Modular Cell System" is being widely used in the developed countries. This system is made heavy duty plastic, is light weight, easy to assemble and no technical skills are needed for their installation. Due its modular nature, it can be designed to any needed capacity. It is designed for traffic load which makes it suitable for placement under driveways, parking lots, sidewalks and roadways. It is relatively less costly and light weight for easy transport. Its use is extremely practical in Kabul for commercial and residential uses. It can be buried in residential and commercial yards, under driveways, parking areas and roadways. It can be constructed both as a detention or retention system. The needed capacity and the number of units needed can easily calculated through the use simple hydrologic equations. If every house, commercial and institutional building retain/detain the water produced on their property through the use of this system, it would mostly solve the flooding problem of Kabul City.

Enforcement of Urban Development Process

Urban development is the planning and process by which metropolitan areas grow. The process involves both legal and technical compliance in area such as city planning, land use, planning permissions, environmental impact, transportation needs, sanitation, water and other land development utility needs.

Unfortunately, the urban development process in Afghanistan and particularly in Kabul has not been followed and enforced as in other countries. In order for Afghanistan to tackle its urbanization problems and protect local residents and the environment, the Afghan Government must develop its urban development policies formally through a transparent and legal process and enforce the legal and technical requirements for city planning and land use.

The Government must create a governing commission comprised of stakeholder members to lead the urban development process. Similar to other countries, the commission will be in charge of the overall planning and approval process. Once the land development has been approved in accordance with established zoning guidelines, the technical detailed plan review process will begin with each relevant agency weighing in. Then, once all stakeholders have been included, the plan will be slated for final approval and permit issuance. Finally, the plan will be monitored rigorously through routine construction inspection and observance of regulations, guidelines and standards by the developers.

An orderly land development process can only be successful if proper planning and enforcement of established regulations, guidelines and standards are applied equally to all applicants. Lack of an orderly process can lead to unruly urban sprawl that results in unequal living conditions and could force the poor into slums or other areas with substandard living conditions. Also, disorderly development could have a major negative impact on the environment and health.

Mohammad Ashraf Roshan

May 1956- October 2017

The Society of Afghan Engineers is saddened for the untimly passing of Mr. Ashraf Roshan, who was a member of the Executive Committee serving as the Treasureer for the past three years. The Society of Afghan Engineers expresses its heartfelt condolences to his wife, Mrs. Tooba Roashn, his three children, and the rest of Roshan family. His departure is a tremendous loss for Society and the Afghan Community in the Washington DC Metropolitan area

Below is a brief Biography of the late Architect Ashraf Roshan.

Mr. Mohammad Ashraf Roshan was born on May 10, 1956 in Kabul Afghanistan. He is the son of Mr. Roshandil Roshan and his wife Momena Roshan.

Mr. Ashraf Roshan attended the Department of Architecture at the Faculty of Engineering of Kabul University. Design and architecture were his passions. With them, he completed several projects at the University and graduated with honors in 1981.

Upon immigrating to the United States, Ashraf.began his career in architecture in Dallas, later moved to Maryland, and cofounded an architectural firm with his wife. He earned his license from the American Institute of Architects.

A prolific architect, Ashraf designed countless residential and commercial projects throughout the mid-Atlantic region and has received several honors for his creative design works.

After events of 2001, Mr. Roshan became actively involved in design and construction efforts in his homeland of Afghanistan and made many trips to assist in the development activities there.
